Repositioning CRIN As A One-Stop-Shop Solutions to Agric. Problems



The Executive Director (ED) of CRIN, Dr. Patrick Olusanmi Adebola, is an exemplary Nigerian who has demonstrated how living can still be meaningful when

life is lived with purpose and integrity. Understanding that no meaningful life can be built on an easy street, he made up his mind to drive his experience and competence with an uncommon audacity and high standards when he was appointed as Chief Executive Officer of CRIN on October, 2020. Today, just a year as the ED CRIN, Dr. Adebola has recorded commendable achievements which are gradually transforming the Institute from the old narratives.

Propelled by a patriotic desire to rebuild and reposition CRIN, he did not waste time before adding flesh to his ideas through an effective implementation of policies which have achieved industrial harmony at the Institute. This has made it possible for him to re-focus the staff towards achieving the mandate of CRIN. Explaining what he has done to reset CRIN to the path of glory, Dr. Adebola noted that "CRIN was always making the news for wrong seasons many years before I came in as the ED, and that somehow affected its core research mandate. There was industrial disharmony and infighting, and incessant strike and other issues. Therefore, the first agenda I tackled was the existing labour crisis. I was able to achieve industrial harmony and boosted the staff morale by operating an open-door policy while paying substantial part of arrears I met. I also reconstituted a management team

through which I brought everybody on board, I have maintained my neutrality and we have been having interactive sessions which allowed everybody to bring his ideas and suggestions to the table. I have gained the confidence of the staff. Furthermore, I did my best to re-instill the culture of research back to the Institute, and redeemed its battered image. With the achievement of these, we are now looking at ways to increase the internally generated revenue of the Institute so that we can reduce the funding gap which has been affecting operations and causing industrial strikes.”



In his words, “I have gone out to reach people in Abuja and everywhere to source funds with which we have been executing our programmes,

part of which is staff training which cuts across the senior and junior cadres. Before now, most of these staff have not gone for any training since they joined CRIN. Apart from this, we organized retreat for senior management staff through which we brainstormed and calm nerves. I have also started the facelift of the dilapidated infrastructure; the administrative office complex was renovated, our Flavour Quality Laboratory was resuscitated, we are working on our fermentary, and the construction of the Institute’s perimeter fencing is ongoing. Solar light has been put in place among other things we have done. Meanwhile, all I have achieved so far could not have been possible, without the support of the Alhaji Abdulahi Jao-led Board, and the cooperation of the staff. These policies and projects are changing CRIN for the better”.

ED Advocates CBN’s Intervention To Boost CRIN Research Efforts



The ED CRIN, Dr. Patrick Adebola, has advocated the Central Bank of Nigeria’s (CBN) intervention towards boosting research efforts in the Institute. Featuring on Channels Television Program, repeated on NTA Channel 251, hosted by the CBN Initiatives, the ED appreciated the efforts of the CBN towards assisting cocoa farmers in the country. He opined that for a lasting and sustainable cocoa production, the Institute must be empowered towards the production of improved hybrid cocoa seedlings. We have the technical expertise, but are limited by inability of funds. The CBN’s intervention, through provision of grants, will enable CRIN to reach millions of farmers in Nigeria with hybrid cocoa. Our training acumen on good agricultural practices will assist the farmers to produce safe cocoa, without pesticide residues, for local and international consumption. With our equipped Flavour Quality Laboratory, we are better positioned to ensure good chocolate flavor of international standard. Financial support by CBN to CRIN will go a long way in achieving President Muhammadu Buhari’s vision towards jobs creation, substantial increment in agricultural outputs, youth and women empowerment, and economic development of Nigeria.

CRIN Distributes Cocoa Hybrid Seedlings To Cocoa Farmers



In demonstration of the Corporate Social Responsibility of the Institute to cocoa farmers in her environment, both in the Headquarters, Ibadan and the Substations, the Institute

in partnership with Federal Ministry of Agriculture and Rural Development (FMARD), embarked on the distribution of cocoa hybrid seedlings to farmers. The process of raising the seedlings began in November, 2020, when the Production and Substation Department of the Institute, headed by a Director, Dr. Moses Ogunlade, was mandated to produce cocoa seedlings for distribution in 2021 season. The project was in different phases starting with the clearing of shade nets and filling of top soil into polythene bags, planting, sorting and maintenance of the seedlings. The success of the project is not unconnected with the dogged managerial ability of the Executive Director, Dr. Patrick Adebola. Also worthy of commendation is the commitment and dedication of the entire staff of Nursery Section as well as the coordinating efforts of the Director, Plantation and Sub-Stations. Over 300,000 seedlings were distributed and the States that benefited from this gesture were Osun, Ogun, Oyo, Kwara, Ondo, Ekiti, Kogi, Edo, Delta, Anambra, Abia, Akwa Ibom and Cross River. Training on Cocoa Processing For Quality Flavour

A week long in-house panelist training was organized on flavour analysis and post-harvest clonal fermentation by the Institute from November 29 to December 5, 2021. The resource person was Mrs Dorine Kassi, a consultant to the World Cocoa Foundation (WCF) on cocoa flavour quality training. It was a hands-on training that encompassed the harvesting of quality cocoa pods, breaking and fermentation of the beans under a natural shade, drying on raised platform and sensory analysis. The programme was geared towards entrenching right practices among cocoa farmers in order to enhance quality cocoa flavour.



together about seven thousand accountants and other professionals from various industries, both from public and private sectors. The Institute was ably represented by the Ag. Head, Internal Audit, Mr. Kuforiji O. Emmanuel. The theme of the conference was 'trust in governance'. In attendance at the conference were Dr. Akinwunmi Adesina, President AfDB, Mrs. Obiageli Ezekwesili and other erudite speakers. As culled from the presentations at the conference, by Mr. Kuforiji, investors' confidence counts in private capital flows to nations. PhD Defense: Dr. E. F. Mapayi



Congratulations to Dr. Elizabeth Folashade Mapayi for successfully defending her PhD thesis on the "Development of an Efficient Tissue Culture - Based

Cocoa (*Theobroma cacao* L.) Regeneration System" at the Department of Plant Breeding and Seed Technology, College of Plant Science and Crop Production, Federal University of Agriculture, Abeokuta (FUNAAB) on 30th November, 2021. Her study aimed at developing a cacao *in vitro* regeneration system through somatic embryogenesis. The floral parts, petal and staminode explants from twelve *T. cacao* genotypes were tested for their abilities to regenerate and develop somatic embryos at different physiological ages. Also, the genetic integrity of the cocoa genotypes was tested through somaclonal variation assessment as detected by SSR markers. Her findings revealed that the *T. cacao* genotypes examined were highly embryogenic. The study concluded that embryogenic capacity of floral explants in *T. cacao* is suggestive of the effects of genetic factors and physiological developments of the callus. The development of *in vitro* regeneration system through somatic embryogenesis method adopted for the study proved to be highly efficient and, therefore, recommended for the genotypes examined under this study. Mr Omitade is highly industrious, respectful and deeply committed to his assignment with minimal supervision. He is happily married with children.
