#### THE CASH IN CASHEW

The recent approach **CRIN** management team led by the Acting Executive Director, Dr (Mrs) Okelana F.A has paid off eventually. The Institute within the short period of reopening have made tremendous progress in the area of providing services to cashew farmers in Nigeria. These has brought CRIN to the limelight and the Institute is now inundated with requests for cashew nuts and farm visits to existing plantations and assistance for establishment of cashew plantations across many states in Nigeria. The yield of cashew occasioned by climate change this year has made it difficult for CRIN to meet the demand of CRIN Scientists in Cashew/Kola Research Department led by, Dr Ibiremo O.S have visited several farms in Oyo and Kwara States. Among these are SMK farms limited Saki, Ivapo farm Offa, Tenleke farm and in Saki. Many farms will soon be visited. In these farms, CRIN soil scientists carried out soil fertility evaluation for cashew establishment. At present, CRIN has prepared over 400kg of cashew nuts for planting in the current year (2016) planting season. CRIN scientists are involved on all the various pre-planting and planting operations in these farm locations.

#### Advances in Kola Research

Project Title: Identification, Selection & Establishment of High-yielding Kola varieties on-farm & on station.

**Background:** Major problems encountered in kola production in Nigeria include long gestation, tall trees, sterility and incompatibility. Many kola farms across Nigeria are very old, with significant reduction in yield.

**Objectives**: i. to identify and collect desirable kola accessions from farmers' plots across Nigeria.

ii. to establish new germplasm plots at CRIN to enhance further research activities.

Methodology: Purposive random sampling was used to collect good varieties of cola nitida and Cola from farmers' plot in Osun, Ondo and Ogun States.

Result: Twenty-five (25) good kola accessions were successfully established on a new kola germplasm plot at CRIN headquarters in 2015 as new plant introductions.

## CRIN PARTICIPATION AT INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY SEMINAR AND EXHIBITION HELD AT OBAFEMI AWOLOWO UNIVERSITY, ILE-IFE.

The seminar started with introduction of guests and opening speech of the chairman Prof. Bamitale Omole Vice-Chancellor, OAU who was represented by Prof. Ajayi, Dean of Faculty of Science. The seminar session started with the theme titled "Inventions and Intellectual Property Rights: The Essentials for Sustainable National Development" and was presented by Dr. Dan-Azumi Mohammed Ibrahim, Director General, NOTAP represented by Engr. J. U. I. Nwosa-(Director/Head of Technology Acquisition and Research Coordination (TARC) Department, Abuja). The second paper seminar titled "Innovations for sustainable National Development" was presented by Prof. L. O. Adekova, former Director. IPTTO, OAU. The third seminar paper on Industrial Property and Arbitration was presented by Prof. (Barr.) O. Oladitan of the Department of Foreign Languages, OAU.

They are also to target the solutions of real-life problems. Government should strengthen the National Research Fund (NRF).

Participants' comments on **CRIN** products: They commended CRIN for producing quality bread through cocoa powder supplementation wished there would be regular supply of the bread to Ife campus of OAU. They frowned at the high price of cashew kernels and asked for reduction in the price. The alcoholic content of the wines was also observed to be too high and should be reduced. They also suggested that perfume should be added to the black and liquid soap to improve their fragrance.

### Recommendation to CRIN management:

CRIN should create an Intellectual Property and Technology Transfer Office (IPTTO). This will encourage Researchers in the invention of new technologies for farmers and industrialists.

#### SUNDWIND COCOA STAKEHOLDER WORKSHOP 12 – 13 APRIL 2016 IN ACCRA GHANA by Dr. A. R. Adedeji

The workshop was organized to discuss the findings of the term of scientists that previously toured some West and Central African countries on the project titled "Strengthening the competitive of Cocoa production and improving the income of Cocoa production and improving the income of cocoa producers in West and Central Africa". Thirty-six (36) participants from six countries including the four (4) most important West and Central African producer countries participated at the workshop. **Summary of Discussion** following eight most important challenges were taken up out of a long list identified during the discussion: Policy and regulation, Access to finance. Unattractiveness of cocoa business, Climate change, Extension/Input, Organising farmers. Price mechanism. Land issues. CRIN attended 2016 South – West REFILS Programme By Mr. A. E. Agbongiarhuoyi

The 29<sup>th</sup> annual event of the South West Research Extension Farmers Input Linkage System (REFILS) took place at the Institute of Agricultural Research and Training (IAR&T) Ibadan, from 26<sup>th</sup> to 29<sup>th</sup> April, 2016.

The programme was attended by Dr. Olubamiwa, O. who represented the Ag. Executive Director of CRIN, Dr. Mrs. Okelana, F. A.; Dr. Oduwole O. O. (Head, Economics and Extension Department), Mr. Oloyede, A. A.; Dr. Oyedokun, V. (Subject matter specialist); Mr. Agbongiarhuonyi, A. E. (Facilitator) and Mr. Olayinka, S. O. (Marketer). Other participants present were from Agricultural Development Programme (ADPs) from the South West; Research Institutes, Private organisations, farmers, Bank Agriculture, etc.

REFILS represents the framework of the research and extension activities in all agricultural zones. Activities entrenched in the system include diagnostic survey to identify limiting constraints of farmers for research and other appropriate technologies in Research stations. It also involves linkage of farmers to input agencies. It provides platforms for harvesting feedback from farmers to appropriate agencies.

The Executive Director of IAR&T, Prof. Adeniran, J. A. welcomed and thanked all guests for gracing the occasion.

The keynote address was delivered by Prof. Omotayo, M. A. of IFESERAR, Federal University of Agriculture Abeokuta (FUNAAB).

Good will messages were given by the representative of the Hon. Minister of Agriculture and Rural Development, Mrs. Awe, C. A. (Regional Director FMA&RD), the representative of the Governor of Lagos State, Hon. Suararu Isiaka Oluwatoyin and Commissioner for Agriculture of Oyo State among others.

The four days event witnessed the presentation of 2015 On-Farm Adaptive Research (OFAR) report, 2016 proposals, Extension and Communication Support as well as Women In Agriculture (WIA) from ADPs.

Research Institutes including CRIN, IAR&T, FRIN, NIHORT and NIFOR made presentations to promote their developed technologies.

**Exhibition:** Some CRIN technologies: Cocoa Bread, Cocoa Wine, Chocolate, Cashew nuts, Black and Liquid Soap, were displayed and sold during the programme.

Preseason Training: CRIN participated in a pre-season training for ADP personnel who will in turn train the farmers. They were trained on cocoa nursery, field establishment practices, primary processing, insect pests and diseases control by Mr. Oloyede and Dr. Oyedokun. The training was well appreciated by the beneficiaries.

The services are highly subsidized by about 60% compared with what is obtained outside. The transport services have taken up since March, 2016. Inter-State transport services have also taken off with several numbers of staff enjoying the service. Other offers include: water supply tanker, internal shuttle and conveyance of goods by the Institute's lorry.
