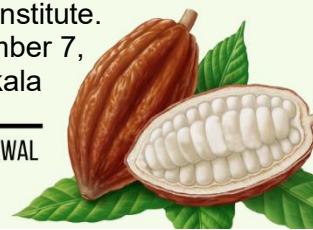

Cashew Activities in Cocoa Research Institute and National Research Strategic Plan for the Federal Republic of Nigeria

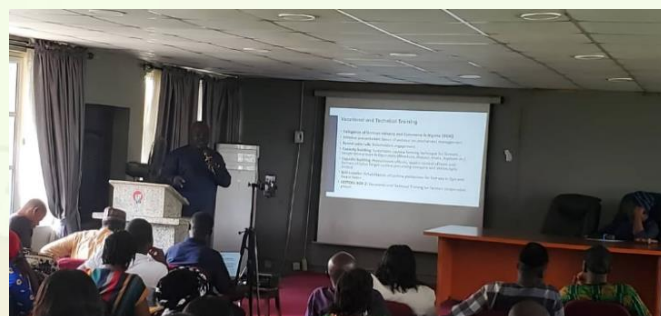

The National Cashew Research Strategy is a comprehensive framework developed to transform Nigeria's cashew sector into a globally competitive and sustainable industry. The strategy outlines a long-term roadmap to address challenges, harness opportunities and strengthen research

and development across the cashew value chain. The strategic plan hope to boost productivity through improved cashew varieties, strengthen value addition and agro-processing, enhance climate resilience and sustainable practices, promote digital innovation in cashew farming and support market competitiveness and international standards. The strategic plan includes bridging knowledge gaps, breeding and improvement, soil and plant nutrition, agronomy, pest and disease management, value addition, extension services, socio-economics and implementation and resource mobilization. The key innovations is

introduction of artificial intelligence and biotechnology in cashew breeding and pest management, development of clonal propagation techniques, adoption of biochar and carbon sequestration models to support climate adaptation and exploration of cashew-oil palm intercrop systems, apiculture for pollination and carbon credit opportunities for farmers.

Analysis (AES) among Cocoa Farmers in Southwestern Nigeria."

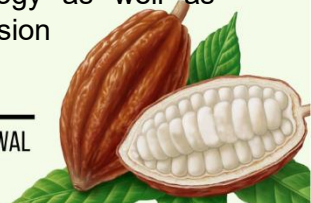

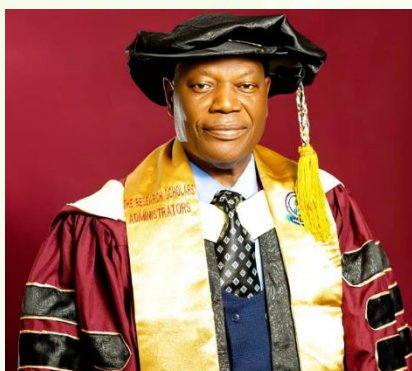

CRIN Scientists at IARSAF 28th Annual Symposium



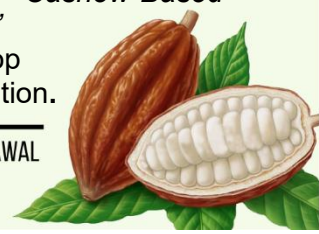
Four scientists from the Cocoa Research Institute of Nigeria (CRIN) participated in the 28th Annual Symposium of the International Association of Research Scholars and Fellows (IARSAF), held from October 28th–31st, 2025 at

the IITA Headquarters, Ibadan. With the theme “Science and Systems Thinking: Driving Climate Resilience and Nutrition Transformation in African Food Systems,” the symposium brought together researchers across Africa to discuss innovations in climate-resilient agriculture, nutrition, digitalization, value chains and food systems transformation. CRIN’s participants comprised Dr. Ogunsowo A.O., Mrs. Okunade A.F., Mr. Ogunwolu Q.A. and Mr. Aremu-Dele O., who actively engaged in scientific discussions relevant to CRIN’s mandate.

The Institute’s visibility was further strengthened through three technical presentations delivered by its scientists. Dr. Ogunsowo A.O. presented “Effects of Solvent-



partitioned Fractions of *Cola acuminata* Seed on Glucose-metabolizing Parameters in Streptozotocin-induced Diabetic Rats,” offering insights into value-added medicinal potentials of kola. Mr. Ogunwolu Q.A. presented an “Economic Analysis of Cashew Farming Systems in Nigeria,” highlighting pathways to climate-resilient livelihoods, while Mr. Aremu-Dele O. delivered a paper on “Awareness of African Yam Bean and Its Prospects for Introduction into Cashew-Based Farming Systems in Ogbomoso,” emphasizing opportunities for crop diversification and improved nutrition.

High Cholesterol- Mrs. Bosede Famaye



What is Cholesterol? Cholesterol is a fatty substance produced by the liver and found in certain foods.

It plays a vital role in various bodily functions, such as:

1. Building and maintaining cell membranes.
2. Producing

hormones (like oestrogens and testosterone).

3. Aiding in fat digestion.

There are two main types of cholesterol:

1. LDL (Low-Density Lipoprotein): often referred to as "bad" cholesterol, high levels can lead to plaque buildup in arteries.
2. HDL (High-Density Lipoprotein): Known as "good" cholesterol, helps remove excess cholesterol from the bloodstream.

Maintaining healthy cholesterol levels is crucial for cardiovascular health.

High Cholesterol is an excess of fats in the blood that leads to opaque buildup in arteries, but it usually has no symptoms until it causes complications like heart attack or stroke.

High Cholesterol Symptoms

- Chest pain
- Shortness of breath
- Paraesthesia ie numbness or tingling in limbs
- Dizziness or headache
- Excessive fatigue
- Fatigue
- Blurred vision
- Change in skin colour

- Yellowing of the skin
- High blood pressure
- Slurred speech
- Impotence

Causes

- i. This includes Genetics: A family history of high cholesterol can be a factor.
- ii. Lack of exercise: Physical activity helps control cholesterol, so a sedentary lifestyle can contribute to high levels.
- iii. Overweight or obesity: being overweight can increase your cholesterol levels.
- iv. Age and Gender: Cholesterol levels generally increase with age and women's levels often rise after menopause.
- v. Unhealthy diet: Eating too many foods high in saturated and trans fats, like fatty meats, processed foods and baked goods, can raise cholesterol.
- vi. Other conditions: Diabetes and high blood pressure are often associated with high cholesterol.

Treatment

1. Lifestyle changes:

Diet; focus on fruits, vegetables, lean proteins and whole grains. Limit saturated and trans fats, sodium and added sugars.

-Exercise: Aim for at least 30 minutes of exercise on most days of the week.

-Weight management: maintain a healthy weight.

-Quitting Smoking: Tobacco use can worsen the effects of high cholesterol.

-Limiting alcohol: Drink in moderation, if at all.

2. Medication: Doctors may prescribe cholesterol-lowering medications, especially if lifestyle is not enough e.g atorvastatin, omega-fatty acid, Niacin etc.

-For severe cases, a procedure called Lipoprotein apheresis can be used to remove Lipoproteins from the blood.



-Regular checkups: see a doctor for regular cholesterol checks, especially if you have risk factors and get a personalized treatment plan.

Complications

- Plaque buildup (Artherosclerosis): High Cholesterol can lead to a buildup of plaque inside the arteries, narrowing them and limiting blood flow.
- Heart Disease and Heart attack: A blockage in the arteries that supply the heart can cause a heart attack.
- Stroke: A blockage in an artery that leads to the brain can cause a stroke.
- Other conditions: High Cholesterol can also contribute to high blood pressure and increase the risk of gall stones and fatty liver disease.

Market Survey

Price Report for November 2025

This report presents an overview of cocoa prices across selected Nigerian states for November 2025. Data were obtained from key cocoa-producing areas within the surveyed states and state-level averages were computed accordingly. During the reporting period, cocoa prices increased in Cross River, Ondo, Osun and Oyo States, while prices remained stable in Abia, Kogi and Kwara States. The most significant month-on-month increase occurred in Osun State, where prices rose by approximately 10%. Across the states, Abia reported the lowest average price at ₦4,800/kg, whereas Ondo State recorded the highest average price at ₦8,750/kg in November. These inter-state differences highlight prevailing market conditions driven by supply fluctuations, production volumes and localized demand pressures. It is also important to note that cashew remains in its off-season and as a result, no price data were recorded for cashew during the month under review.
