The Cocoa Research Institute of Nigeria (CRIN) hosted the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with the Foundation for Afro Agritech Inclusive Development (FAAID) and African Agritech Dynamics Limited (AGRITECH) on December 24, 2025. The ceremony marked a significant step towards a Joint Investment Venture (JIV) agreement aimed at boosting cocoa production and agricultural techno development in Nigeria.

The meeting, chaired by CRIN's Acting Executive Director, Dr. A.R. Adedeji involved a review of the MoU and corrections to ensure accuracy. Representatives from CRIN, FAAID and AGRITECH signed the MoU in triplicate, with one original designated as the Legal Luminary copy.

project timetable. The committee comprises four CRIN nominees and two nominees each from FAAID and AGRITECH. The project kicks off at CRIN headquarters before expanding to two sub-stations namely Ajassor (Cross River State) and Ibeku (Abia State).

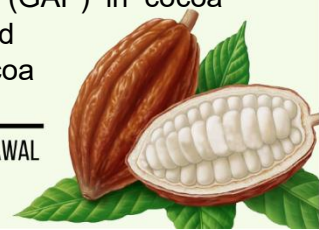

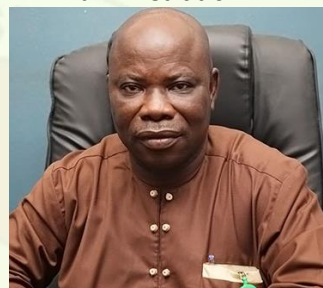

Without doubt, Mr. Oguntona's appointment will contribute significantly to the Institute's ongoing reforms and drive for improved service delivery.

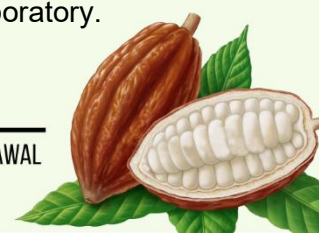

Heart Failure - Mrs. Bosede Famaye



Heart failure occurs when the heart muscle is unable to pump blood effectively. This can cause blood to back up, leading to fluid buildup in the lungs and shortness of breath.

Certain heart conditions can gradually weaken or stiffen the heart, making it harder to fill and pump blood properly. These conditions include narrowed arteries in the heart and high blood pressure. While heart failure can be life-threatening, proper treatment can improve symptoms.





and potentially extend lifespan. Lifestyle changes can significantly enhance quality of life and may include achieving weight loss, engaging in regular exercise, reducing salt intake and practicing effective stress management.

In severe cases, heart failure may require more intensive treatment such as heart transplant or implantation of a device to assist the heart in pumping blood

Heart failure is sometimes called congestive heart failure.

Symptoms

If you have heart failure, your heart can't supply enough blood to meet your body's needs.

Symptoms may develop slowly, sometimes, heart failure symptoms start suddenly..Symptoms include:

- Shortness of breath with activity or when lying down.
- Fatigue and weakness
- Swelling in the legs, ankles and feet.
- Rapid or irregular heartbeat
- Reduced ability to exercise
- Wheezing
- A cough that doesn't go away or a cough that brings up white or pink mucus with spots of blood.
- Swelling of the belly area
- Very rapid weight gain from fluid buildup
- Nausea and lack of appetite
- Chest pain if heart failure is caused by a heart attack.

Causes

Heart failure can be caused by a weakened, damaged or stiff heart. If the heart is damaged or weakened, the heart chambers may stretch and get bigger and the heart can't pump out the needed amount of blood. The heart muscle can be damaged by certain infections, heavy alcohol use,

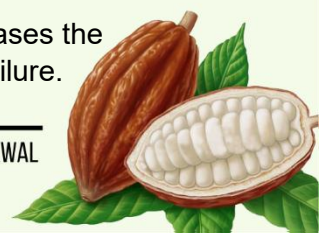
illegal drug use and some chemotherapy medicines. Your genes also can play a role.

1. Coronary artery disease and heart attack is the most common cause of heart failure. The disease results from the build-up of fatty deposits in the arteries.
2. High blood pressure. Also called hypertension, this condition forces the heart to work harder than it should to pump blood through the body.
3. Heart valve disease. If a valve isn't working properly, the heart must work harder to pump blood and this can weaken the heart overtime.
4. Inflammation of the heart muscle also called myocarditis, commonly caused by virus which can lead to left sided heart failure.
5. Congenital heart defect
6. Other diseases such as Diabetes, HIV infection, an overactive or under active thyroid or a build up iron or protein.
7. Allergic reactions
8. Blood clots in the lungs
9. Viruses that attack the heart muscle

Risk Factors

Diseases and conditions that increase the risk of heart failure include:

- Coronary artery disease
- Heart attack
- Heart blood pressure
- Diabetes
- Obesity
- Viral infections
- Aging. The heart's ability to work decreases with age, even in healthy people.
- Alcohol use. Drinking too much alcohol may weaken the heart failure.
- Smoking or using tobacco increases the risk of heart disease and heart failure.

Complications

- Kidney damage or failure due to reduce blood flow to the kidneys
- Other heart problems. Heart failure can cause changes in the heart's size and function.
- Liver damage due to fluid buildup that puts too much pressure on the liver.
- Sudden cardiac death due to weakness of the heart.

Prevention

One way to prevent heart failure is to treat and control the conditions that cause it.

These health tips can prevent its occurrence.

- Quit smoking
- Get plenty of exercise
- Eat healthy foods
- Maintain a healthy weight
- Reduce and manage stress
- Take medications as directed

Diagnosis

Physical examinations and symptoms presented. Tests such as Blood tests, chest X-ray, Electrocardiogram (ECG or EKG), Exercise tests or stress tests, CT Scan of the heart, Heart MRI scan, Myocardial biopsy.

Treatment

This depends on the cause. Treatment often includes lifestyle changes and medicines. Some people with heart failure need surgery to open blocked arteries or to place a device to help the heart work better.

Medications

A combination of medicines may be used to treat heart failure depending on the cause.

- i. Angiotensin-converting enzyme (ACE) inhibitors. These drugs relax blood vessels to lower blood pressure, improve bloodflow

and decrease the strain on the heart e.g Lisinopril and captopril.

- ii. Beta blockers. These medicines slow the heart rate and lower blood pressure e.g metoprolol and bisoprolol.
- iii. Diuretics, such as furosemide which makes you urinate more frequently to prevent fluid buildup in your body.
- iv. Digoxin also called digitalis, helps the heart squeeze better to pump blood.

It's very important to see your doctor for Medical check up if you are experiencing any of the symptoms analysed above. Heart failure is a life threatening condition.

Market Survey

Price Report for December 2025

This report presents an overview of cocoa prices across selected Nigerian states for December 2025. Data were obtained from key cocoa-producing areas within the surveyed states and state-level averages were computed accordingly. During the reporting period, cocoa prices remained relatively unchanged in most of the reporting states except in Osun and Oyo States where prices increased by approximately 3%. Across the states, Abia reported the lowest average price at ₦4,800/kg, whereas Ondo and Oyo States recorded the highest average price at ₦8,750/kg in December. These inter-state differences highlight prevailing market conditions driven by supply fluctuations, production volumes and localized demand pressures. It is also important to note that cashew remains in its off-season and as a result, no price data were recorded for cashew during the month under review.
